## Which Rights?

- The Universal Declaration of Human Rights of 1948 has four pillars: dignity, liberty, equality, and brotherhood
  - First two have roots in Western Enlightenment
  - Third reflects socialist principles
  - Fourth reflects goals of decolonization
- Two separate treaties were passed in 1966
  - ICCPR, championed by US, protects civil and political rights
  - ICESCR, championed by USSR, economic and cultural rights

## A Failed Campaign?

- Though human rights agreements have ↑, abuses have not ↓
- Ratification of the CAT associated with more torture
- Many gov's offer pretense of freedom w/ rigged elex
- Typical response to state-led mass killings is none at all
- Repression typically increases following economic sanctions

- Economic benefits often tied to HR practices
  - Preferential trade agreements
  - World Bank loans
  - Foreign direct investment
- Improvement without economic incentives
  - Reassurance and compliance with laws of war
  - Demobilization of agents of oppression
